

Creator of Luminaries - Yotzer Hamaorot

The Hebrew word <u>yotzer</u> – Creator – contains the root word <u>yetzer</u> – or inclination, desire, energy, force of spirit. Both <u>yetzer</u> – desire, need – and <u>yotzer</u> – Creator – are appropriate descriptions of Brother Thomas' continuing creative force.

For two score and ten years he has been consumed by the need to create works from clay. Each day, week, month, year has been filled with his efforts to fashion from clay an object of visual and spiritual beauty.

For two decades of this journey, we have been privileged to exhibit, present, share the fruits of his labor.

As we unpacked his most recent works, the phrase for the prayer service "Yotzer Hamaorot" rang in my ears. The Creator of Luminaries is usually understood as the Creator of heavenly bodies – the moon and sun.

Why not apply this title to the <u>Creator</u> Brother Thomas and <u>Luminaries</u> to the extraordinary works he has made? Each work illuminates our eyes, heart and spirit. The luminescent copper red, ice crackle glaze over sang de boeuf, the glistening iron blue, the profound honan tenmoku, the ethereal dark celadon floating in a light celadon heaven are all among his luminaries.

So may we celebrate many birthdays and anniversaries. Brother Thomas' 50 years as a fine art potter; our 20 years of friendship and relationship; these new works which will serve to enlighten and enliven our lives.

"A Brook Too Broad for Leaping"

This book you are holding was a total surprise to me. I had no clue that it was a thing-in-process until it was a product in front of me.

It was a touching surprise, one for which I experienced an inner gratitude. It touched something we all experience from time to time, i.e., the inadequacy of words to express some of our deepest awareness. There are no words without experiences behind them, but there are experiences for which there are no words.

We have to use language to convey our experience, even for a "thank you", but when the thank you experience reaches deeply, words seem to fail. We sense that we are in an intuitive place outside the reach of words. It feels that we are left standing on the banks of a brook too broad for leaping.

I am very moved by the oneness of spirit in this volume, grateful for the people behind these words, many of whom are


much-loved friends, others I know, still others I have not met in person. But, paradoxically, I know them all. I know them all in the binding spirit beyond their insightful words. We meet everyday in the inner experience of that spirit, an experience none of us could ever, or ever want, to define - yet could never deny.

It is a terrible experience, not terrible in that outer sense of terrifying, but terrible in that inner awareness of wonder and awe.

Art is one of the outer doors onto this inner experience, but art does not provide any statements, even though we insist on trying to fit the experience into our wordworld of logic and reason in a futile attempt to measure an immeasurable experience. What art does provide are riddles. Arts' riddles have this value: they shift our consciousness away from logic and reason, to the non-rational intuitive realities of our inmost being. It allows us to embrace the paradox that lies between the rational and the non-rational.

I am aware that when I say in this sweet book of "meeting the not-met" and "seeing the not-seen", I appear to be either unaware of, or defying the logical law of non-contradiction:, i.e., "...that a thing cannot be and not be at the same time". But, a paradox does just that and perhaps shows that our philosophy has limitations our spirit does not.

What we see and hear in any authentic art form is only the consequence of the unseen, the mere click on a Geiger counter. What lies beyond anything we see or hear in the material object cannot be verified by anything in this outer world of sensory perception, reason, logic and language.



There is a world of experience that does not yield to our senses or bend to the high courts of intellect and logic. It is not invisible but it is non-visible. The invisible world. both its microcosm, too small for us to see, and its macrocosm, too big for us to grasp, or those decibel levels too low or too high for us to hear, can be enlarged. made visible, brought nearer or amplified by our technology. But the non-visible world of the Beautiful, the True, the Good, the One and the Ineffable is no less there, no less real, no less part of our world but can only be reached by the pathways of the heart. Art is one of those pathways.

Like the mystics we need to embrace the paradoxical experiences of our own inner non-visible nature. These experiences do not yield to language as when I meet you whom I have never met and hear what you have really said beyond the words you have actually written and feel your presence beyond your absence and feel no contradiction lies between them:

WE WERE PARTED MANY THOUSANDS OF KALPAS AGO, YET WE HAVE NOT BEEN SEPARATED EVEN FOR A MOMENT. WE ARE FACING EACH OTHER ALL DAY LONG, YET WE HAVE NEVER MET.*

Lovers know this experience for sure, the experience of presence and it is this holy paradox of presence-in-absence that one who has died leaves within the one who has not.

So when I attempt this simple "thank you", know that it is not for your words alone, not for your work, your thoughts alone, but for the spirit behind it all.

It is not a "thank you" of this outer world which we may not share, but a "thank you" for that inner world we do.

Art, like poetry, music, myth and life itself, is the language of the spirit that ferries us across that brook too broad for leaping.
